I recently learned that Mike Rowe used to work for QVC, sang opera and was a TV news reporter before he found his success with the TV show Dirty Jobs.

Dirty Jobs was not a hit TV show overnight – it was while he was working as a news reporter for a TV show in San Francisco that his grandfather told him, "When will I ever see you do

some real, honest work?"

The next day Mike set up an interview with a sewer repair worker because repairing a sewer is definitely, 100% honest work. Mike and his cameraman met the sewer worker on the street, then followed him into the underworld of San Francisco.

He began trying to do the traditional TV interview but there were constant interruptions from rats, cockroaches and the obvious contents of the sewer that were disgusting, smelly and that were literally flying everywhere!

After a while Mike knew that >>

the same old thing wasn't working, so he simply began to work alongside his interviewee and have a conversation with a man who had dedicated his entire career to repairing one brick at a time in San Francisco's sewers.

The day and the interview eventually ended and Mike and his cameraman got cleaned up, very thoroughly, and then Mike began to watch the footage of the day in the editing room.

The most powerful and compelling footage wasn't

the traditional interview – it was the hilarious footage of Mike's reaction to a cockroach crawling into his mouth and the content of the conversation between Mike and the sewer repair worker that formed the story that made the final cut.

When Mike pitched the story and showed the footage to his boss, he was promptly fired, but he knew he had something special, something interesting, something that his Grandfather would call "real and honest work."

The following months and years involved Mike pitching his idea to feature everyday people, their

jobs and their stories, to anyone and everyone who would talk to him.

Over 30 meetings later, Mike met with the Discovery Channel team and the show Dirty Jobs was conceived. The convoluted, crazy and meandering

Nexar asks you to mount your phone to your dashboard, and it will monitor surrounding traffic. If someone starts driving dangerously, it will ask if you want to record what's going on with a 30-second video. The goal is to capture license plates of bad or hostile drivers. This is useful if you witness a crash or a criminal offense. According to trafficsafetystore.com, Nexar also uploads data to a central database. It will let you know if someone with a bad driving history enters the camera's field of vision, helping you spot potential bad drivers. In the future, Nexar plans to use GPS to identify dangerous cars to the side and behind them, too. Safety Resource Center -December 1, 2016

GONE? Remember when they said tablets would outsell desktop and laptop computers? That now seems a tad optimistic. In March, Techcrunch. com reported that tablet sales are going down. But why? It turns out that folks treat tablets like computers — meaning they don't upgrade them nearly as often as smartphones. "The iPad 2 is still in use today," IDC Senior Analyst Jitesh Ubrani tells TechCrunch. "The [original] iPad Minis and Air are all still in use today. They were being supported by Apple until very recently. People have been hanging onto these devices and they're finding that they work just as well as they did when they were released.". That's bad news for the tablet giants, who are still releasing new versions of tablets at least once a year. In the future, don't expect big releases or online unveilings for slates.
