## Classified Information Is The New Currency: How Security Technology and Stealing Critical Data Has Shaped Our World

Throughout history there has been a race to develop advanced technologies in an effort keep classified information safe alongside, an equally intense effort to crack the code and expose the vulnerabilities in the same cutting edge technologies.

The Enigma machine was an encryption tool used by the German and Axis forces during World War II to send classified messages to further their invasion of Europe. The German spy gave these photos to the Polish Cypher Bureau who used the information from the photos to reconstruct a replica of the machine that helped them decipher the encrypted messages of the enemy.

The allied forces used their Enigma machine to covertly decrypt important strategic Axis messages and give advanced warning and important strategic advice to the Allied forces. The ability of the Allied forces to decrypt this information played a decisive role in shortening the length of the war and is credited for saving an estimated 14 million lives.

The Germans and Axis forces had NO IDEA that their prized encryption technology was ultimately useless.

In the event of cardiac arrest, every minute that passes without CPR and defibrillation lowers the victim's chance of survival by 7% to 10% percent according to the American Heart Association. The new First Responder phone app, created by the European Heart Rhythm Association, was designed with this in mind. It uses GPS tracking to locate nearby trained responders to administer aid, notify emergency services, and direct rescuers to



the scene of the incident. During trial runs in Lubeck, Germany, 36 percent of cardiac arrests were addressed by an app rescuer three minutes before professional responders arrived on the scene. *Digitaltrends.com* 6/23/17
